Recognizing, 1st: That the newspapers are the "daily bread" of the intellectual life of our people;

2nd: That it would be desirable to "leaven" this "bread" every day by putting into it systematically more quickening, vital truths, more timely councils, and more searching and helpful interpretations of the day's events from many minds outside of newspaperdom; and

3rd: That, as the newspaper press is primarily a commercial institution, and not primarily a moral institution, the logical and consistent method of doing this would be to gather these contributions from such sources, and make them of such vital, human interest, of such rare timeliness, and of such "special feature" nature that they would each command a ready entrance to, and a reasonable price from, the press, just as professional "copy."

Therefore, we, the undersigned, would welcome the opportunity to make a reasonable, logical overture to the press through a responsible press syndicate which, as the authorized agent for said contributions, would deal frankly with the press upon a commercial basis, and would render desired service in the following ways: first, as a lever to lift the embargo against moralizing which, in varying degree, necessarily exists in a commercial institution like the press; and second, as an instrument to mix this "leaven" throughout this daily mental food upon which the fibre of our life so largely depends.

We recognize that this effort would be most timely; that the colossal and multitudinous changes taking place throughout a restless world, which are daily spread before us by the newspapers like chapters in a serial story of surpassing interest, of deepest pathos, tragedy and dramatic situation, are in themselves a call and challenge to this daily work. Should not we of America particularly, at this period in the evolution of our press and people, unite to disseminate great principles and profound convictions in the above manner?

In consideration of the facts recited, and wishing to do our duty in a strategic movement of this kind, we agree to put our contributions through such a commercial channel, and, without incurring any other obligation or responsibility of any kind, promise to furnish one thousand words, more or less, on personally elective subjects annually, with full copyright privileges, and to accept therefor usual syndicate remuneration. Our individual contributions of manuscript are not to be asked, however, without sufficient notice being first given, and in no case until after the particular annual series of articles, for which said contributions are asked, shall be fully assured by the united contributors therefor.

would most respectfully suggest that, in view of your manifold relations to, and monumental services for, the American people, a personal message from you would complete and crown the proposed series in the press of America. It is thought that such a gracious act of cooperation on your part would, by its instant influence on both press and proposed contributors, practically determine that three hundred other American and foreign leaders in the fields of religion, education, politics, business and social organization, would not only be willing, but would also at once be privileged, by the press, to speak to the American people through a simultaneous syndicate system, on their respective days, and so bring vital truth to bear on the business of life every business day in the year.

subscribe our names hereto, not to serve any individual or personal interests, but to serve the project and to hasten the realization of its goal which is, in a word, to have the heart of America speaking daily to Americans, and ultimately, through an internationalized system, to have the heart of England speaking daily to Englishmen, the heart of Germany to the German race, the heart of France to her countrymen, etc., etc., around the world, in the interest of the Common Good.
