LUIZ BONFA

Luiz Bonfá, Brazil's brilliant Cannes Festival award winning composer of "Manha de Carnaval" and "Samba de Orfeu" for the picture BLACK ORPHEUS, visited the United States for the first time in 1957. Soon afterwards he was introduced to Mary Martin, with whom he toured 60 American cities. Bonfá then recorded his first two LP's in the United States.

Bonfá has also visited Europe, appearing on TV shows in Stuttgart, Berlin, Rome and Amsterdam. While in Rome, he composed and played the background music for the Italian film "L'Ore Damore."

In November 1962 he participated in the first Bossa Nova Concert in America, held at Carnegie Hall, New York City, a tremendous success that was repeated at the Lisner Auditorium, in Washington, D. G. Next, invited by Nick Vanoff, he performed on the "Perry Como Show."

After fulfilling radio and TV contracts in Brazil, Bonfá returned to the United States in 1965. He appeared at New York's The Village Gate, gave a concert at Miami's Dade County Auditorium and was a guest on the "Hollywood Palace" TV Show.

Bonfá ranks among the kings of the Brazilian sound. A prolific composer, he has written more than a thousand songs. No one who saw the film "Black Orpheus" will forget its enticing score. His genius is most recently demonstrated as composer of the score for the motion picture "The Gentle Rain," soon to be released, in which he also plays the guitar.

Bonfá has recorded for Mercury, Verve and Capitol Records. In his latest album, BRAZILIANA just released by Mercury—he plays and sings with Maria Toledo the songs from "The Gentle Rain."

MARIA TOLEDO

Maria Toledo possesses the rare ability to sweep an entire audience along with her in a torrent of passionate sound.

Whether the passion is carnal love, maternal devotion, reckless abandon or the tender sentiments of boy-meets-maid, Maria Toledo is mistress of all she essays.

Miss Toledo has entertained audiences throughout Europe, North and South America.

She has recorded for Mercury and Verve labels, her latest LP being "Braziliana."
